LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

2022 was a year of survival and remaining rooted in our values. With many major events that occurred over the last year, including the lasting impact of the wildfires in Southern Oregon and the pandemic impacts have affected the lives of Oregonians – these circumstances have continued to illustrate disparities and inequities across the state and within several communities, exacerbating our efforts to bring change. Despite the investments and resources allocated to the communities we serve, it is still not enough.

Through this year, we learned to adapt and be creative to move a bold agenda that closes the gap in reaching more communities. We recognize that we cannot use the same incremental strategies that once worked to achieve this vision. The pandemic has shown us that anything can change at a moment's notice and to survive the inevitable waves of change, we must challenge ourselves to try new tactics and think outside the box.

This year, we celebrated our 20th year of serving our communities. We hosted our first policy action summit, launched our first community garden in East Portland, led new programs and campaigns, and increased our staff size and board engagement.

In 2023, we will carry out the plan to convert our headquarters into a Climate Resilience Innovation Center to provide emergency cooling and heating with emergency supplies as well as offer a space for resource navigation, a childcare center, and a workforce development hub. We invite you to deepen your commitment to our work in 2023. You, our members, shape our agenda and the direction of our organization. To work toward an intercultural movement for justice in Oregon, we need all of us to materialize this bold vision. If you have been thinking about getting involved, now is the time.





HOUSING JUSTICE

In collaboration with our partners, we provided leadership development, housing advocacy, and eviction prevention programs. Our programs aim to cultivate housing leaders, and provide access to emergency housing, rent assistance, and protection from eviction. With the help of our volunteers, our door-knocking campaign informed community members about free legal aid and rent assistance.

We Protect Us: In 2022, we held multilingual renters' rights workshops, sponsored by City of Portland, to educate Portland tenants about tenant rights, current resources available for renters, and strategies to share this education with our community. Access to Emergency Housing: In 2022, our Rogue Valley Chapter launched the Access to Emergency Housing campaign to ensure emergency housing and fair housing is open to everyone regardless of their documentation status.

Statewide Housing Hotline: This year, our Service to Organizing department launched a statewide Housing Hotline, sponsored by City of Portland and OHCS. This department assists community members by connecting them to housing resources and answering housing questions.

CLIMATE JUSTICE

Climate Justice Listening Tour

Unite Oregon partnered with various organizations to conduct a virtual climate justice listening tour from July to October 2022. Unite Oregon's Climate Justice team led listening sessions throughout specific regions of Oregon to educate our communities on current statewide policies, the Just Transition framework, and Participatory Budgeting. We also wanted to hear the needs, concerns, and ideas of the frontline communities we serve regarding climate and environmental justice. The climate justice team deployed an online survey and conducted one-on-one interviews to support this process to supplement the listening sessions We hope to utilize this information to support the Unite Oregon's strategic plan, influence state-level policies over the coming years, as well as support the development of the statewide environmental justice mapping vulnerability tool.

East Portland Community Garden

This year, our Pan-Immigrant Leadership Organizing Training (PILOT) leadership development cohort launched our first community garden in East Portland. The 20,000 square foot plot community garden will promote food sovereignty, retain indigenous sustainability practices, and provide entrepreneurial opportunities for immigrants/refugees to grow, produce, and sell food to generate income.

Wildfire Relief & Emergency Preparedness

Our Rogue Valley chapter is supporting community members with wildfire recovery as well as preparing for future climate disasters. This community-led project addresses urgent community needs such as the need for emergency preparedness and attention to the negative health impacts of wildfires. In partnership with Oregon Community Foundation (OCF), Unite Oregon distributed gift cards, air purifiers, and emergency-go bags to community members in need of resources in Rogue Valley and Clackamas County. We also filmed a documentary with Rogue Valley community members about their experiences with the wildfire. This project aimed to bring awareness to how the wildfires impacted and are still affecting the community.

By the Numbers: 40 air purifiers, 500 emergency go bags, and \$50k in gift cards distributed in Rogue Valley and Clackamas County



EQUITABLE ECONOMIC INVESTMENT

Southwest Corridor Equity Coalition (SWEC)

Unite Oregon continued to lead the coordination between the partners and different subcommittees/workgroups of the Southwest Corridor Equity Coalition (SWEC). This year, more culturally-specific organizations joined SWEC.

- SWEC Community Leadership Cohort Program: The first group of participants from the SWEC Community Leadership Cohort program graduated in October 2022. We will be launching our second cohort soon.
- Anti-Displacement in the Portland Southwest Corridor: Unite Oregon was able to secure funds from the Portland Clean Energy Community Benefits Fund (PCEF) to plan projects focused on housing stability and energy efficiency.

West Portland Town Center (WPTC) Plan: Together with several SWEC partners, Unite Oregon met with members of the Portland City Council in September to advocate for the adoption and equitable implementation of the plan's recommended draft

Anti-Displacement PDX (ADPDX) Coalition

is a leadership development program and cohort that address the needs of those facing displacement, especially Black, Indigenous, immigrants, refugees, and People of Color residents in the Portland Metro region. ADPDX focuses on empowering, educating, and developing advocacy skills to create opportunities that minimize displacement risks for our communities.

BIPOC, Refugee, Immigrant **Development, Growth, and Economic** Sustainability (BRIDGES) Program In early 2022, Unite Oregon launched a free small business incubator program for immigrant, refugee, and BIPOC community members. In partnership with Mercy Corps Northwest, the **BRIDGES** program provides a culturally responsive training series on how to launch and operate a small business and courses on civic engagement, community organizing, leadership development, and policy advocacy training. Next year, a number of participants will be able to access small business loans and start Individual Development Accounts.

HopeGrove Legacy

Unite Oregon launch a state-wide childcare business program for community members who have or are interested in starting a childcare business. Launching in early 2023, HopeGrove Legacy will provide education on how to launch and operate a childcare business, community organizing, and funding their business. Furthermore, we hope secure centers to provide small business owners the ability to offer more services.

Beaverton Organizing and Leadership Development (BOLD)

With our partners, City of Beaverton, Unite Oregon celebrated ten years of our Beaverton Organizing and Leadership Development (BOLD) program, which provides a leadership development program for emerging immigrant and refugee leaders who live in the city of Beaverton. Community members build cross-cultural relationships as they grow their leadership skills and learn about civic engagement. Unite Oregon has graduated a total of 180 community members from the program since its inception.





HEALTH EQUITY

In 2022, the Supreme Court overruled Roe v. Wade, taking away the constitutional right to abortion. Abortion is still accessible in Oregon and we are fighting to protect our rights by organizing our most impacted IR-BIPOC communities.

Reproductive Justice


Our Rogue Valley Chapter focuses on the rights of IR-BIPOC communities to access reproductive care and make informed reproductive decisions. Unite Oregon provides available resources, education, and access that community members need to make the best decisions for themselves and their families. Our Forward Youth cohort in Rogue Valley has been working towards reproductive health and justice in the rural Latinx community. This year, our youth came together in listening sessions to learn about reproductive health access.



As the COVID-19 pandemic continues, our communities struggled to access comprehensive and culturally responsive healthcare and treatment options. In response, we launched a Community Health Worker Program, training, and State certifying two CHW's who helped advance Unite Oregon's Health Literacy goals. Through our COVID-19 response efforts, we have distributed PPE and education materials to about 10,000 community members living in vulnerable populations. In October 2022, Unite Oregon (along with nine other organizations) was awarded Health Equity and Access Immunization Champions at the National Adult and Influenza Immunization Summit.

EDUCATION EQUALITY

Building Undergraduates through Inclusive Leadership Development (BUILD) Program

Our BUILD program supports parents of BIPOC students in three Portland Public Schools high schools in addressing systemic barriers to educational attainment. The program provides parent programming on leadership development, issue organizing, and mobilizing. During the current 2022-2023 school year, we are serving **43 families**.




Youth-Led Involvement through **Engagement and Leadership Development (YIELD) Program** Our YIELD program supports **BIPOC** students at three Portland Public School middle schools in developing the necessary skills to collectively address educational inequalities they face within their schools. This year, we secured funds to expand our program to Washington County. The program provides students with workshops and activities centered on leadership development, organizing, advocacy, and public speaking.

POLICY ADVOCACY

Refugee, Immigrant, People of Color, Political Leadership and Education (RIPPLE)

Our Refugee, Immigrant, People of Color, Political Leadership and Education (RIPPLE) program educates community members on how to organize, advocate for communities, turn ideas into policy, and run for office. Our goal is to amplify political power for immigrants, refugees, and Black, Indigenous, People of Color (BIPOC) in Oregon, who make up only 10% of Oregon's State Legislators.
